INTRODUCTION



HISTORY

The Oakland County Service Center began to take shape in 1866 when 100 acres of land was purchased from Mortimer Osman for development of a County Poor Farm. Since then, the Service Center has grown to over 620 acres and is divided by Telegraph Road. It is laid out in a campus setting according to a master plan designed to meet operational needs and to be functional, efficient and aesthetically pleasing. Most of the County's departments and institutions are presently housed here. One of the principals designed into the Service Center is its "community" concept of campus development whereby similar or related functions are grouped together.

OVERVIEW

The purpose of this report is to provide an inventory and brief description of the County Executive's properties and Facilities Management operations. The County's primary location of operations is the 443-acre complex known as the Oakland County Service Center. The Service Center is located in the City of Pontiac and Waterford Township and is the hub of Oakland County Government. On it are 41, County buildings with a total of 1,693,304 gross square feet.

Additionally, there are seven County-owned facilities located off the Service Center totaling an additional 294,476 gross square feet. The three, District Court buildings in Novi, Clarkston, and Troy are leased.

Included in this report are photographs of the buildings, statistics detailing their size and cost, and a brief description of the building's history. Information concerning campus roads, parking lots, their occupants and utilities are included here in as well.

All buildings on the Service Center are identified with a building number and illustrated on the Center Campus Map (see next page). An on-line aerial picture of the Service Center is located at www.oakgov.com/fm/programsandservices/Pages/Campus-Energy-Use.aspx, which also provides each building's energy use history.

<u>ABOUT FACILITIES MANAGEMENT</u>

The Facilities Management Department plans, designs, constructs, renovates, operates, maintains, repairs, and provides security for the facilities and grounds owned and maintained by the Oakland County General Fund.

In addition, the Department:

Prepares and administers all lease agreements,

- · Assists departments in the sale or purchase of property, and is
- Responsible for the preparation of the County's five-year Capital Improvement Program.

It's overarching mandate is to comply with and operate within the spirit of Public Act 139, Sections 8 and 13 which state that, "...the appointed Manager and County Executive shall submit to the board a proposed long-range capital improvement program and capital budget," and that, "The department...shall...plan for, assign, manage and maintain all county building space... [and] shall...perform general engineering, construction, and maintenance functions for all County department...".

MISSION STATEMENT

To continuously ensure that all facilities and grounds are operated on behalf of the County Executive and the other County elected officials in accordance with the highest standards and best practices of both the public and private sector, within the constraints of available resources, to support a safe, secure, effective, and professional physical environment for the employees and citizens of Oakland County.

GOALS

- Evaluate and improve the cost-effectiveness of operations through benchmarking with similar public and private sector organizations.
- Continuously improve support service responsiveness.

FACILITIES MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS

The Facilities Maintenance & Operations (FM&O) Division is responsible for energy management, building maintenance, building alterations, facilities security, operations, utilities, custodial services, and grounds maintenance. FM&O oversees 46 County facilities with 1.9 million square feet of space on 600 acres of grounds, 60 acres of parking lots, and over 30 miles of utility lines and heating service tunnels. Support services are provided to approximately 95 departments, division, and units operating in the County's facilities, and contracted services are provided to Parks & Rections, the Road Commission, the Airport, and other agencies.

<u>GOALS</u>

Administration (OSHA) requirements, Indoor Clean Air Act, asbestos awareness, building control technology, and other legislation impacting facilities and grounds.

- Provide, in a cost effective and quality manner, a safe and comfortable environment for the efficient operation of business for both County employees and the public they serve.
- Evaluate and improve the cost effectiveness of operations through benchmarking with similar public and private sector organizations.
- Continuously improve support service responsiveness.
- Continual evaluation of leveraging private sector services and expertise consistent with the above goals.

<u>ADMINISTRATION</u>

The administration unit oversees long and short-term planning, financial management, communications, computer applications, space allocation, personnel matters, operating procedures, technical support, purchasing, and clerical functions to support other FM&O Divisional units.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE & ARCHITECTURAL

The FM&O Maintenance & Operations unit has responsibility for the day to day operations, maintenance, repair, and alteration of the County's structural, mechanical, electrical, and architectural infrastructure in all County-owned facilities. In addition to the general office requirements, specialty environments for large computer operation centers, Medical Examiner autopsy functions, kitchen services, crime labs, gun ranges, and medical unit requirements fall under the control of this unit.

BUILDING SAFETY

The Building Safety unit provides building security for over 40 County facilities. Their responsibilities include routine after-hours inspections and alarm monitoring of fire, security, and equipment on a 24-hour, sever day-a-week basis. Nearly 3,000 alarm points, 640 card access readers, and 585 CCTV cameras are administered and maintained by the unit. A 24-hour centralized control center is staffed for reporting of facility-related problems, alarm monitoring, and dispatching of appropriate personnel. The unit also oversees the opening and closing of all County buildings on a daily basis, along with the raising and lowering of all flags. Building Safety also handles:

- Submission of safety issues (contact information, email), maintenance of
- Emergency contact numbers and names by facility, and implementation of the
- Facilities Management Emergency Response Plan.

GROUNDS MAINTENANCE

The Grounds Maintenance unit in FM&O oversees the maintenance and landscape construction on the Service Center grounds and the County outlying facilities, including lawns, and irrigation systems, now removal, on-site composting and brush/tree chipping, pest control, signage, and minor asphalt repair.

CUSTODIAL

The Custodial Unit is responsible for the cleaning of facilities on and off of the Service Center, including floors, waste management, doors and window washing services, and recycling. Custodial services are provided by both County employees and contractors.

CENTRAL HEATING

On a 24/7 basis, Central Heating operates, performs preventive maintenance, and make necessary repairs to the high-pressure steam boilers that provide heating, cooling, and hot water to 15 campus buildings, including the Courthouse and Law Enforcement Complex. Central Heating also performs preventive maintenance and necessary repairs to 1.3 miles of underground steam tunnels and the steam utilities that contain the steam distribution network and condensate return piping.

BUILDING UTILITY SYSTEMS

The Building Utility Systems unit monitors the purchase, distribution, cost accounting, and system maintenance of all gas, electric, steam, water, and sewer utility services to the County. Conservation efforts include improved efficiency of building HVAC, lighting, and equipment; the education of both facilities and user staff; and support of the Green Team and the County's Energy Management Procedure's

FACILITIES PLANNING & ENGINEERING

The Facilities Planning & Engineering (FPE) division is responsible for the Project Management of major construction and renovation projects undertaken by the County. It oversees the cost estimating, planning, design, construction, inspections and testing of new County-owned facilities, roads, parking lots, and utilities.

FPE is also responsible for design and construction management of interior renovation projects, design and coordination of furniture installation, and move management services for existing County buildings. In addition, it performs planning for exterior building maintenance projects such as roofing, caulking, waterproofing, masonry restoration, window replacement, parking lots and sidewalks.

FPE prepares the five-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), forecasts future County space needs, and prepares the Facility Master Plan, along with maintaining space allocation, assignment data and more than 12,000 facility record drawings and campus utility infrastructure records. FPE also provides technical support to Facilities Management Administration and FM&O.

BUILDING AUTHORITY

The Oakland County Building Authority was established to finance the construction of local projects through the issuance of limited tax general obligation bonds by the building authority. Consistent with P.A. 31 of 1948, the Building Authority may also build, acquire, furnish, equip, own, improve, enlarge, lease, operate and maintain County facilities where a legitimate public purpose of the County is served.

The Building Authority meets every second Wednesday of the month at 9:00 a.m. in the Facilities Conference Room of the Public Works Building (One Public Works Drive) in Waterford Township. Its Board consists of five (5) members, including three (3) members appointed by the Board of Commissioners, plus the County Executive or a Designee, plus the County Treasurer or a Designee.

Note the following trends:


- The County continues to be fiscally cautious following the recession.
- The number of projects conducted each year is increasing.
- Law Enforcement and Judicial and code compliance projects will consume much of the CIP.
- Security will continue to be a design issue for new projects and is part of all renovations.
- The construction industry is very busy and contractor costs are rising. This puts a strain on department and project budgets.
- Leased facilities are the most difficult to keep well-maintained in a timely manner due to our dependency on landlords and third-part service providers.
- Staffing levels remain constant.
- Funding leads remain constant.
- New projects take longer to start & complete.

Major Accomplishments of late include:

- Construction of a new Animal Shelter facility on the main campus
- Addition of a connector at Oakland Pointe for consolidated security access to the north and south buildings
- Development of a building address and way-finding system to assist the public and Public Safety Agencies in getting to their destinations
- Purchase and remodeling of the Executive Office Building
- Selling West Oakland Office Building
- Leasing Quality Pontiac Dealership for use by the Sheriff's Office
- Improved pedestrian access on campus and between buildings
- Transfer of Farmer's Market to Parks & Recreation
- Major security improvements (e.g., deputy security stations, crash-rated fencing, gates, and berms; expanding the security camera system, etc.)
- Acquisition of the old Boy Scouts of America building
- Mothballing much of the Brown Road Complex
- Construction of a new Children's Village Counseling Center

The building currently consists of a two-story section that was built in 1928, as a residence for nurses who worked at the Contagious Hospital; two separate two-story additions added in 1956 and 1957; and two, one-story additions constructed in 1959 and 1961. The Board of Education later occupied the annex until 1969 when the Oakland Schools building became available.

The Administrative Annex II is one of the older buildings on the Service Center. In the past, this facility served as the central offices for the State Department of Social Services in Oakland County. The department quickly outgrew this building and in 1971 Social Services was moved to 196 Oakland Avenue in Pontiac. This vacancy then provided the much-needed office space for District Court Probation, Equalization, Friend of the Court, Planning Division and the County Reference Library. In 1980, when the Executive Office Building became available for occupancy, the Library and Planning Division were relocated there. The Friend of the Court and Equalization was moved to the Oakland Pointe Office Building in 1995. The reference library was moved to the Courthouse in 1994. The facility is currently used primarily for long term Record Retention.

A new \$15.4 million-dollar Animal Shelter & Pet Adoption Center was opened on the County's main campus in Pontiac in 2017. The shelter was previously located on Brown Road in Auburn Hills in a building acquired from the Humane Society in 1981. The Sheriff's Office provides trustees for various grounds, custodial, and maintenance duties. The Center provides housing for animals brought in from Oakland County cities, villages, and townships, or picked up by the County's own Animal Control Road Division.

The Central Garage provides service, preventive maintenance, repair, and storage for County vehicles. A computerized gas monitoring and pumping system was installed in 1983 and upgraded in 2010. Radio Communications occupies the rear portion of the garage addition.

A 5,800 square foot expansion of the garage and radio communication shop was completed in 2014.

The Central Heating Plant, built in 1947, houses the main Service Center Steam boilers. The Central Laundry also occupied part of this facility until 1982 when laundry services were contracted to outside vendors. In 1982, a steam efficiency improvement program was implemented to reduce the main loop pressure from 125 psi to 80 psi to conserve energy. In 1986, the laundry portion of the building became the Sheriff's Men's Satellite Facility until early 2010.

The central heating portion of this building contains four steam boilers which can supply over 150,000 pounds of high-pressure steam a day through 1.76 miles of underground steam tunnels to the following County buildings on the Service Center: Easter Seals, Administrative Annex II, Central Services, Central Garage, Courthouse, Law Enforcement Complex, Medical Care Facility, Sheriff's Administration Building, Information Technology, North Office Building, Little Oaks-Child Care, North Oakland Health Center, and Pontiac Health. The four boilers are designed to fire on natural gas or oil, whichever can be procured at the best rates.

The Village consists of ten (10) separate facilities that provide an opportunity to deal with the individual problems of the residents. It affords a home-like atmosphere for the troubled children coming to the attention of the court.

The Children's Village "J" Building is an intake and detention facility for maximum-security male juveniles. Construction of a gymnasium, holding cells, and two (2) classrooms was completed in 2003 along with the addition of a new wing to house the secure treatment and intake unit.

The Children's Village "K" Building is a central kitchen which provides food service for the entire Children's Village Complex.

A significant remodeling took place in 2013, including the addition of a walk-in freezer and refrigerator to the rear of the building. An outdoor dog kennel was added in 2014 in the open space east of the building as a learning and therapy activity for the children.

In 1979, a new Children's Village School was constructed to provide a better learning environment for the children in residence. In addition, truant children from all parts of the County attend this facility as part of a "least restrictive environment" program of education. The school is staffed by the Waterford School District. Both regular and special education programs for grades K-12 are accommodated in the School.

Originally built as an animal care shelter, the building was remodeled for use as a dry-cleaning plant after Animal Control moved to Brown Road. Dry cleaning services are now contracted out. In 1986, the building was remodeled to house 32, medium security female inmates for the Sheriff's Department. In 1989, the female inmates were moved to the Jail as a result of its expansion. Medium security males were then assigned to this building until the Greenan medium security facility became available. In 1998, the facility was assigned to the Community Corrections Division for use by the WWAM Program. In 2010, Community Corrections and the WWAM Program moved to Oakland Pointe allowing the County to terminate the lease of a building on Dixie Highway. Building D is now vacant.

The Courthouse Complex is the seat of the Oakland County Judicial System. The complex consists of the Court Tower, West Wing, Board of Commissioners offices and Auditorium, East Wing, and West Wing Extension.

The Court Tower was built in 1960. Currently housed within the Tower are the majority of the Circuit Court Rooms, Judge's Chambers, the County Clerk and Sheriff's Detention Facilities.

In 1972, construction of the Law Enforcement-Jail Complex was completed. This facility replaced the County Jail in the City of Pontiac. Subsequent improvements included the installation of better cell lighting, a two-way communication system for inmates and guards, and a new gymnasium. In 1987, construction began on an extensive addition providing space for an additional 488, inmates; a visitor reception center; and extensive remodeling of the existing Jail and kitchen. The extension was completed in February 1989, and like the original construction was financed through the Building Authority. A second-floor addition over the east end of the facility was constructed in 2002 to house 25, single person cells. Renovations to the Medical Clinic, Records Unit, staff lockers, mechanical equipment, and the Sheriff's Crime Lab were completed in 2003.

The Oakland County Cemetery is located just across the railroad tracks from the Main County Service Center on West Blvd. and was acquired in 1866 as part of the original 100-acres. The primary purpose of the cemetery was as a final resting place for the poor and indigent residents of Oakland County.

Over the years, the jurisdictional responsibility for the cemetery has passed from the Superintendent of the Poor to Waterford Township to the City of Pontiac and finally to the County in 1954.

Records indicate that 1,187 people are buried in the Cemetery which now is at its maximum capacity. One hundred forty-six graves indicate an "unknown" occupant and 270 are occupied by infants. The first burial in the cemetery was in 1878, the last in 1972.

The Facilities Maintenance and Operations Division is responsible for the maintenance of Countyowned utilities located on the Oakland County Service Center.

Electrical

The majority of the electrical facilities on the Service Center are serviced by an underground 13,200-volt electrical distribution system nearly all facilities have dual electrical feeders with throw over capabilities for added protection in case of power loss on one of the feeders. The electrical distribution system is ten miles long and delivers 24,018,728 kwh of electricity to campus buildings each year.

Natural Gas

The natural gas distribution system is six miles long and delivers 238,535,000 cubic feet of natural gas to campus buildings each year.

Steam Distribution System

The majority of the facilities on the east Service Center are serviced by a steam system, which originates at the Central Heating Plant and is distributed through a tunnel network. The tunnel system is over two miles long and extends as far as the Oakland County Road Commission complex.

Water

The facilities are serviced by a nine-mile-long looped water distribution system. Water and sewer services on the east side of Telegraph Road are purchased from the City of Pontiac and on the west side from Waterford Township. Most campus buildings are double-fed to protect against he loss of water from one source or the other.

Grounds

The campus-wide irrigation system is controlled by moisture-sensors to conserve water. The system is metered separately from the sewer system to minimize City/Township charges.

Sanitary and Storm Sewers

The sanitary sewer system is over six miles long and the storm sewer system is eight miles long.


Parking Lots and Roadways

Parking lots cover 53, acres of the Service Center and 16, acres of our off-campus sites. In addition, over five miles of roads and drives provide public access to the buildings. There is parking available for 4,875 cars on the 65 Service Center lots which range in capacity from 2 to 491 cars each. There is parking available for 1,781 cars on the 15, lots at off-campus buildings, which range in capacity from 18 to 313 cars each.

Sidewalks

The Service Center and Oakland Pointe have nearly seven miles of sidewalks.
