WIC Immunization Services
(Women, Infants & Children Supplemental Food Program)

An integrated model provided enhanced access to immunization services for WIC clients. This approach increased WIC immunization rates by 17% for infants and children age 19-36 months. This strategy has sustained immunization compliance for years following initial implementation.

### Community Assessment for Public Health Emergency Response (CASPER)

OCHD was one of only eight counties nationwide to collaborate with the CDC and Michigan Department of Community Health to exercise the Community Assessment for Public Health Emergency Response (CASPER). Although this assessment method is designed to determine the needs of a community after a disaster, OCHD proactively practiced CASPER pre-disaster to enhance Oakland County's response capacity and determine key aspects of our citizens' overall preparedness level.

Long-Term Care & Hospital Partnerships Enhance Emergency Preparedness Efforts



Oakland County Health Division's Long Term Care (LTC) Partnership and Hospital Partnership Committees provide a forum where public health, emergency management and health care officials can exchange information related to emergency preparedness, response planning, community disease surveillance and best practices that improve community health overall.

One of the greatest achievements has been the involvement of the LTC Partnership in the development of the Closed POD planning. Closed POD planning assures that appropriate facilities receive medications for residents and/or staff during a public health emergency. Fifty perfect of Oakland County's LTC facilities are committed to designing medication dispensing plans. In 2012, the Health Division developed eight Closed POD plans that will protect 11,700 people during a crisis. Three plans were tested through practice exercises.

#### **Community Partnership Aims** at Healthy Eating

Oakland County Health Division received grant funding in 2012 from the Michigan Department of Community Health to support the community driven efforts of the Healthy Pontiac, We Can! (HP, WC!) Coalition.

One of the coalition's major successes was launching a new produce market at St. John United Methodist Church in Pontiac to increase access to healthy foods. This market is one of the few in Oakland County that accepts EBT benefits. The Super Foods Taste and Try Challenge program promoted healthy eating among Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) eligible adults from the Baldwin Soup Kitchen in Pontiac. Taste testing and cooking classes encouraged almost 300 residents to learn

how to incorporate locally grown fruits and vegetables into their diets.

**OCHD Collaborates** to Address Homeless Issues

In 2012, Oakland County Health Division (OCHD) spearheaded the Homeless Healthcare Collaboration to address the health issues and concerns of homeless and vulnerable populations in Oakland County. The ultimate goal of this collective effort is to address barriers to healthcare and housing. In addition, an OCHD Public Health Nurse (PHN) facilitates connections by visiting shelters, soup kitchens, and agencies that provide services to these populations such as Grace Centers of Hope, South Oakland Shelter, Welcome Inn, HAVEN, Salvation Army and the Baldwin Center. During these visits, the PHN assesses public health needs and connects the agencies and individuals to OCHD services and other resources. More than 60 organizations have benefited from this program.
