

What You Need to Know



WHAT IS FENTANYL?

Fentanyl is a synthetic Opioid that is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. It is a major cause of fatal and nonfatal overdoses in the U.S.

TWO TYPES OF FENTANYL:

- Pharmaceutical fentanyl is prescribed by doctors to treat severe pain, especially after surgeries.
- Illicitly manufactured fentanyl, which is distributed through street drugs like heroin.

WHAT ARE SIGNS OF AN OVERDOSE?

- · Small, constricted pupils
- Unable to wake
- Slow, weak or no breathing
- · Choking or gurgling sounds
- Cold and/or clammy skin
- Discolored skill (especially lips and nails)

HOW CAN SOMEONE REVERSE AN OPIOID OVERDOSE?

Naloxone (Narcan) is a life-saving medication that can reverse the effects of opioid overdose. Narcan is available free of charge throughout Oakland County. STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO SAVE A LIFE:

- Call 911 immediately
- · Administer Narcan, if available
- · Check breathing and administer CPR, if necessary
- If the person is breathing, lay them on their side to prevent choking
- Repeat the naloxone if no breathing after 2 minutes
- Stay with the person until help arrives

FENTANYL TEST STRIPS:

 Fentanyl test strips are available and can be a helpful tool in detecting if there is Fentanyl present in the drug supply. Call Oakland County Harm Reduction at 248-858-1729 for information about free test strips.

HARM REDUCTION TIPS:

- Carry Narcan and know how to use it
- Don't use alone
- Test your drugs if you can
- · Ask us for help when you are ready for treatment
