Crime Stat Article Might Be Suspect

The recent article published in the March 2003 Eccentric Newspapers has me troubled. The article titled "Crime Stats Might Be Suspect" requires that I respond to clear up some confusion. The article penned by Pat Murphy, a reporter with a history of credibility and fairness; never the less, misses the mark on accuracy.

The article asserts that Oakland County Crime Statistics for Independence and Springfield Township for the year of 2002 was suspect: "Statistics for 2002 are in question due to CAD/CLEMIS issues." The statement attributed to the accuracy of criminal reporting to CLEMIS, MICR, and UCR.

Captain McCabe of the Oakland County Sheriff's Office called the Eccentric the day the article appeared and pointed out the inaccuracies of the article. Reporter Pat Murphy apologized for the inaccuracies stating he misunderstood what he was told. Mr. Murphy said he would correct this matter by writing a follow-up article on the CLEMIS success story and its 31-year history.

The facts are simple: currently, and for the past thirty-one years, the criminal incident information is hand-keyed into the CLEMIS computer system. The only jeopardy to the accuracy is the person that entered the information within each police jurisdiction. The same old axiom "junk-in junk-out" still applies. But CLEMIS has always audited and provided the errors for each jurisdiction to perform their own

edits. The data is the sole property of each agency.

The assertion that CLEMIS or CLEMIS CAD caused error is patently inaccurate and untrue. It's obvious that this confusion was not intentional but rather a misunderstanding. The conclusion was drawn from a lack of understanding of the CLEMIS system.

The integrity of the data is as good as the entering agency.

At the October 16, 2002 CLEMIS Advisory Committee Meeting, CLEMIS Manager, Joe Sullivan reported he had received several complaints about a police department using CLEMIS equipment to send messages to recruit personnel for a job opening. The following motion was passed at the meeting:

"I MOVE INTER-AGENCY JOB POSTINGS AND / OR JOB RECRUITING VIA ANY CLEMIS SYSTEM OR CLEMIS COMMUNICATION DEVICE BE STRICTLY PROHIBITED. THIS CONDUCT WOULD BE CONSIDERED A VIOLATION OF CLEMIS POLICY AND REFERRED TO THE CLEMIS USER & TERMINAL COMMITTEE FOR REVIEW."

The User & Terminal Committee will review any violation and make a proper recommendation to the Chief or Director of that agency. Disciplinary action may be necessary.

By serving as a technical link among multiple agencies, **CLEMIS** promotes communication and sharing of criminal justice information. **CLEMIS** standards and policies, as established and monitored by the Advisory Committee, are important in assuring the integrity of information entered into the **CLEMIS** System . . .

West Bloomfield wins CLEMIS Cyber Force Award

On October 16, 2002 Officer Jeff Haupt of the West Bloomfield Township Police Department received the CLEMIS Cyber Force Award. Officer Haupt responded to a Retail Fraud at a local CVS Drug Store.

Lt. Carl Fuhs of West Bloomfield PD told the committee a CVS customer had stolen merchandise and left the scene. After a description of the suspects vehicle was broadcast, the vehicle was stopped by a Keego Harbor officer. Officer Haupt arrived at the scene, recovered the stolen merchandise, and arrested two of the occupants for Retail Fraud.

The two occupants were booked and printed with CLEMIS Livescan equipment. The Livescan technology indicated one of the suspects as another identity. One that was wanted on several outstanding felony warrants; including a Detroit warrant charging Murder I, Assault with Intent to Commit Murder, Felony Firearm, and Flight to Avoid Prosecution.

Had the Livescan response not provided his true identity in a timely manner, the suspect may have been released from custody having received only an ordinance citation for the Retail Fraud.

It is because of the action taken by Officer Haupt that he is awarded the CLEMIS Cyber Force Award for this quarter.

First in the State to Submit Charging Data Electronically

In conjunction with the CLEMIS Livescan System, the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office uses the Prosecutor's Information Management System (PIMS) to electronically submit charging data to the Michigan State Police (MSP) Criminal History Records Unit. A TCN is required on any case in which the defendant is in custody. TCN's are also requested when a defendant has been booked and released; pending issuance of a warrant. This allows the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office to update as many records as possible; thereby reducing data entry duties of law enforcement agencies.

The Oakland County Prosecutor's Office updates all requests for warrants daily, using the TCN to retrieve the data entered by the police agency. The defendant's name and OCA# listed on the screen are double-checked against the police report submitted for the warrant to ensure the correct record is updated. Criminal History Records are then modified in one of three ways:

- Warrant Authorized. A recorded arrest disposition is modified from "warrant requested" (REW), or "pending further investigation" (PFI) to "charged for prosecution" (CHG). A criminal tracking number (CTN) is assigned, and charge data is entered.
- ♦ Warrant Furthered. A recorded arrest disposition is modified from "warrant requested" (REW) to "pending further investigation" (PFI).
- ♦ Warrant Denied. A recorded arrest disposition is modified from "warrant requested" (REW) to "released" (REL).

The PIMS system can also generate demographic reports tailored to a specific police department and time frame. These include "Cases Open Without Charge Activity by Prosecutor's Office", "Cases Furthered by the Prosecutor's Office", and "Retention Code "N" or Null". To aid police agencies in their records' management process, the "Null" report is e-mailed daily while the "Open" and "Further" reports are e-mailed weekly. MSP also advises police agencies of their pending cases by sending a list on the first of each month via LEIN. This list enumerates cases that have not been closed and identifies them by a PFI (pending further investigation) or REW (warrant requested) moniker.



The Oakland County Prosecutor's Livescan Administrator works closely with staff from the local police agencies, Information Technology, CLEMIS, and MSP to quickly and accurately reconcile discrepancies that result from daily warrant submissions as well as those noted on the weekly and monthly reports. Such cooperation is essential to maintaining the integrity of the Michigan CCH data.

The Livescan fingerprinting system in conjunction with PIMS will promote a greater accuracy of Michigan CCH data. This system should prevent CCH entries from missing "Arrest", "Charge", and "Judicial" segments. It will increase the efficiency of the police, prosecutors, and courts, and facilitate investigations and apprehensions, as well as sen-


Madison Heights wins CLEMIS Cyber Force Award

IDENTIX Livescan Training

In the continuing commitment to provide the highest level of support to CLEMIS users, four members of the CLEMIS team traveled to Minnetonka, Minnesota in September and October for advanced Livescan Support training.

IDENTIX has always provided maintenance programs and training to their customers, but those programs do not provide the skills needed to fully support the product. Sgt. Kim Rossman of the Oakland County Sheriffs Department, and Project Manager for Livescan, was able to negotiate with IDENTIX to provide our technicians with the same training they give to their field support engineers.
