CLEMIS Manager's Report

New CLEMIS activities continue to move forward. The long awaited new Voice Over IP Radio System was launched November 11, 2003 in the City of Farmington. The Director of Public Safety for Farmington, Gary Goss, reports that the coverage is beyond expectations.

The "Network First" Pilot project was launched November 12, 2003. The "Network First" function is part of the new M/A COM Radio System but must be recognized as a powerful and distinct function. This function allows for the interoperability of desperate radio systems. Simply put, Fire Fighters and Police Officers can now communicate with other agencies on mobiles or portables, regardless of their radio systems or frequencies. This function is not a radio "patch" that some agencies may have had experience with in the past.

The launch of this pilot was two days short of the seventh anniversary of the Wixom Ford shooting. This technology would have allowed all the departments participating in the Wixom problem to have communication with one another on the scene. Those agencies that intend to operate via systems that are not M/A COM will be able to communicate in an agile manner. In an effort to illustrate this agility, the Michigan State Police were talking car to car with Oakland County agencies at the press release on November 12, 2003.

CLEMIS is the FIRST IN THE NATION in

Public Safety to innovate this radio interoperability effort. It should be noted that elements of the U.S. Military are also implementing this M/A-COM integration technology.

Dynamic Imaging was selected as our mugshot solution provider. They have finished the design of the interface with the digital fingerprint vendor, Identix. CLEMIS is currently working out the details of an interface with the Michigan State Police. The net result of the cooperative effort with MSP would enable an officer to access both databases with a one-query transaction.

The new Video Arraignment System is being beta tested between Circuit Court Judge Young and the Oakland County Jail. The Judge has stated that the time-savings on the current level of use is about 66%. Oakland County recently received a

Auburn Hills wins CLEMIS Cyber Force Award

Officer Ivette Negron of Auburn Hills PD received two nominations from her colleagues for the CLEMIS Cyber Force Award.



The arrest of a "dangerous drug dealer" appeared on Channel 7 Action News. This story was submitted by Sgt. Mike O'Hala of Auburn Hills PD.

Officer Negron was dispatched to Wal-Mart for an \$8 Retail Fraud. When she arrived, she was told the suspect had no identification. While transporting the

subject to another location, he claimed to be having an asthma attack. Medical staff was obtained and the subject's vital signs were normal. Officer Negron continued to process the suspect including electronic fingerprinting on the CLEMIS Livescan unit. The officer discovered there were two felony warrants for dangerous drugs, one misdemeanor warrant for assault, an attempted homicide, and a lengthy CCH. Officer Negron turned an \$8 Retail Fraud arrest into a multiple count felony arrest.

The second story, also a Retail Fraud, was submitted by Sgt. Steve Groehn.

Officer Ivette Negron responded to a Retail Fraud at Meijers. After transporting this female suspect who could only identify herself verbally, Officer Negron fingerprinted the suspect using the CLEMIS Livescan unit. The officer was able to acquire the real name of the female. She was wanted for a parole violation, the original charge being breaking and entering, second offense.

Due to the technological advancements CLEMIS has provided the police departments, this subject was incarcerated, unable to commit other crimes.

Officer Negron received the "CLEMIS Cyber Force Award of the Quarter" at the July 17, 2003 Advisory Committee meeting for these arrests. She was excited about getting a Best Buy gift certificate for her contribution to the law enforcement mission as she was looking forward to purchasing an MP3, another advanced technological device.



Typical reports include beverage spilled inside mobile data computers, screen damage from long guns, and power supply problems. Clean power feed and surge protection is the sole responsibility of each agency.

OAKVideo

The Video Arraignment Project, named "OAKVideo", went live October 21, 2003. Judge J. Young of the 6th Circuit Court is now performing bench warrant proceedings using a variation of the new system.

This system involves the implementation of video conferencing equipment and associated peripherals in order to connect District, Circuit and Probate Courts, the Prosecutor's offices, County Jail, Community Corrections, local jail booking facilities, and law enforcement agencies across the county. The goal is to minimize the transport of offenders, improve court security, and reduce the costs of law enforcement. This system will be unique to any system presently in use today. The County's system will be a multi-point system (able to connect multiple sites simultaneously) with full document retrieval over the existing OAK-Net system. OAKNet is the fiber optic network that connects the County's local area network to all cities, villages and townships within Oakland County.

There are three basic component configurations. A desktop based unit, which will be used at the Prosecutor's office, Community Corrections, and at law enforcement sites as a replacement of the existing video warrant systems. The law enforcement community as well as the prosecutors will not only be able to see and hear each other, but also using a web browser and inte-

grated signature device and scanners, be able to share pertinent documents in real time. The second unit is a self-contained remote controlled system for holding cells, similar to the unit shown. In the courtrooms, judges and / or court administrators will use a web based control system to connect the sites, control camera, audio, and room lighting functionality at the far end units in holding cells, as well as view all case documents at the same time.

The system is augmented with a "queuing" system. The judge or court administrator will see which locations have defendants ready for arraignment, and the order in which they connected to the system. By simply selecting the case, and clicking the "start arraignment" button, he/she will be prompted to connect the appropriate sites, or review the associated documents from the police department, prosecutor, or community correction offices.

At any time before or during an arraignment, the judge can initiate a "side bar" conversation for a defendant and an attorney in the courtroom, or other remote site. A single button will facilitate the Holding Cell device to become a hands free phone. The judge enters the phone number for the attorney, and the holding cell camera will lock out all external video and audio feeds and place a private call to the attorney's phone. Once the conversation is complete, the judge can end the call, releasing the lockouts, and with a single click reconnect all the remote sites, and restart the recorders.

When an arraignment is complete, the video and documents are stored on a centralized server. A web browser interface will allow users to review documents or download video files for review.



Rather than create cumbersome input screens, the County's goal was to make data entry as simple as possible. Prosecutors, law enforcement agencies, jails and courts will use their existing forms as input. Electronic forms such as word processing templates, with electronic signatures, will be copied to the central server. Hand written reports can be entered though the systems integrated scanner, and stored as well.

The County is currently in the process of prepping the early adopter sites, and waiting for the delivery of equipment for all sites. The early adopters of the system are the Ferndale 43rd District Court, Ferndale Police Department, Troy 52/4 District Court, Troy Police Department, Clarkston 52/2 District Court, surrounding law enforcement agencies, Oakland County Jail, the Prosecutor's Office, and Community Corrections. The schedule is to have all of the early adopter's sites operational by November 28, 2003. Shortly after the pilot sites are operational, the remainder of the project will begin. The present schedule calls for a county wide project completion of April 30, 2004.

Officer Moschel observed a female running to a vehicle from a CVS Pharmacy entrance/exit. The female got into the drivers position and drove out of the parking lot onto Woodward Avenue in a rush. Suspicious of her hurried nature, the Officer followed the vehicle and radioed Dispatch to call CVS to see if a Retail Fraud had just occurred. The Retail Fraud was confirmed and the vehicle description and suspect information matched the suspicious female and her vehicle.

Officer Moschel pulled the vehicle over. There was an adult male as the front seat passenger and two small children in the back seat. The stolen property (several cases of beer) was located and the subject was arrested. The female provided false identification which was verified by the CLEMIS Livescan System. The subjects name was entered into the CLEMIS System, and there were eight outstanding warrants originating from six District Courts, in three different counties. The suspect provided an immediate written confession to the Retail Fraud.

Officer Moschel received the CLEMIS Cyber Force Award and a Best Buy gift certificate at the CLEMIS Advisory Committee meeting on April 17, 2003. Nice arrest Officer James Moschel, and congratulations Bloomfield Township Police Department!

Immigration Customs Enforcement

The Detroit ICE –

(Immigration Customs Enforcement) office was given a National Security assignment as part of Operation "Liberty Shield" just prior to the Iraq War. ICE was assigned 2,565 names to check for Criminal History, to verify Immigration status, and if necessary, to locate those persons. There was a very short time frame available to complete these assignments, such that it was virtually impossible for ICE to run all the names on its single LEIN machine. The LEIN Field Services office was contacted, to see if there were any options available. Their immediate response is that the people to contact were at CLEMIS. ICE was advised that CLEMIS likely had both the facilities and the personnel that were necessary.

CLEMIS personnel readily provided ICE a demonstration of, and training in the system capabilities. CLEMIS was able to provide not only a modern and expansive facility, but also the ready availability of highly proficient personnel, and CLEMIS made both the facilities and the personnel available to ICE Special Agents on a 24/7 basis. With the assistance of CLEMIS, ICE was able to accomplish all of the necessary checks, and to complete the assignment before the commencement of the Iraq hostilities. I can say without reservation that the successful completion would not have been possible without the resources provided by CLEMIS.

The most recent initiative that the U.S. Department of Homeland Security has assigned to ICE is Operation "Predator". This Operation, which is presented in detail on the Homeland Security website, is a nationwide focus on sexual predators who victimize children. Basically, Homeland Security is placing a priority on

anything that threatens the safety and security of this Country, irrespective of whether the threat is external or internal. ICE will establish and maintain a clearing-house of the Sex Offender Registries from all States.

Until now, every State has maintained its Registry in a different manner, and there is not necessarily a cross-reference when someone moves to another State. Aside from centralizing the information, ICE will also determine whether a person listed on the registry is a foreign national who is subject to removal from the United States.

The Michigan Sex Offender Registry lists 31,644 people, for which ICE must run a variety of checks to determine where the person falls into the prioritized categories of Operation "Predator." Given the immensity of this task, far larger than Operation "Liberty Shield", ICE again sought the assistance of CLEMIS. Without hesitation, CLEMIS again accorded ICE the use of their state of the art facility, and CLEMIS personnel worked over a weekend to configure their machines to use the ICE ORI, so that the machines were available as soon as possible.

Agents worked at the CLEMIS facility for over two weeks, utilizing the 15 machines in their training room. It is readily discernible that far more work has been possible using the CLEMIS facility that could have been accomplished using the single ICE machine. It is not only the number of machines, but also their capabilities and configurations, as well as the proficient and experienced personnel, that have made it possible. ICE has experienced a tremendous spirit of cooperation with CLEMIS, as they were quick to aid us in this program to enhance the safety of the public.
