
## **ABOUT OAKLAND COUNTY PARKS**

Since it was first established in 1966, Oakland County Parks (OCP) has played an important role in the lives of Oakland County residents. Many have cherished memories of taking family camping trips, walking the trails, attending nature programming, enjoying golf outings or spending hot summer days at a waterpark. The parks system started with 200 acres. Today, it boasts more than 7,000 acres and 100 miles of trails across 17 locations and hosts nearly 2 million visitors from across 62 communities each year. OCP provides a huge variety of recreation, leisure and learning opportunities at two nature centers, three dog parks, five golf courses, a waterpark, an ORV park and the Oakland County Farmers Market.



## **ABOUT ADAPTIVE RECREATION**

Adaptive Recreation ensures that individuals with disabilities can participate in any program or event hosted by Oakland County Parks. Accessibility in parks is so important because it gives individuals of all abilities the opportunity to enjoy and benefit from these outdoor spaces. Accessible parks promote inclusivity by providing facilities, pathways and amenities that cater to people with disabilities, the aging population, families with young children and others. Making parks more accessible allows everyone to connect with nature, engage in recreational activities and socialize, and improves their physical and mental well-being, fostering a more equitable and enjoyable community experience.



## **MEET SANDY DOREY**

Sandy Dorey, CTRS, has been the Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist for Oakland County Parks (OCP) for over 30 years. Sandy has a passion for working with diverse populations, including individuals with physical disabilities, developmental disabilities, at-risk youth and active adults. She loves to create programming that is engaging, promotes social interaction, improves overall health and enhances quality of life through recreational activities that are tailored to specific needs and interests. Her programs foster inclusivity and promote relationship-building, which is an essential life skill for us all.



At OCP, Sandy has developed countless successful programs that are enjoyed by volunteers and participants alike, year after year. She is the driving force behind the popular Disability Dirt Days program at Holly Oaks ORV Park, which pairs experienced ORV drivers with participants with disabilities for thrilling off-road adventures. Sandy heads up DiversAbility Days – which features adaptive outdoor recreation opportunities, sports and games – for OCP, and organizes many seasonal social events for individuals with disabilities and their caretakers.





Sandy has shared her experience and expertise by serving in leadership roles on numerous committees in her field, including as executive board officer for Athletes with Disabilities Hall of Fame; therapeutic chair and committee chairperson for Michigan Parks and Recreation Association; director of the Michigan Wheelchair Basketball League; and committee chair for Race for the Cure. Sandy has served as a games director and a board member for Michigan Disability Sports Alliance, and as both a committee member and a board member for Northwest Parks and Recreation.

Sandy also has professional experience working with the Michigan Department of Education; the Community Connection Grant with Beaumont Hospital; the Athletes with Disabilities Hall of Fame – Adaptive Sports Coalition; BlazeSports America and the Paralympics. Sandy graduated from Wayne State University with a Bachelor of Science in Parks and Recreation with an emphasis on Therapeutic Recreation and a minor in Gerontology.

## **ADAPTIVE GOLF**

The following programs will be offered:

**Adaptive Golf Clinics** – Participants will learn basic skills with adaptations. Clinics will be held at Cherry Creek Golf Club in Shelby Township and Red Oaks Golf Course in Madison Heights.

**Adaptive Golf League** – Bi-weekly golf league for individuals with disabilities. Groups will be paired with staff/volunteers that can assist individuals with adapting their game.

## **QUIET ZONE**

In 2024, Oakland County Parks introduced the Quiet Zone at select large-scale events to promote sensory inclusivity. The Quiet Zone is a dedicated space where individuals can recharge in a calm, accommodating environment.

Designed to be free from sensory triggers like food, drinks and perfumes, the Quiet Zone provides a range of supportive tools, including auditory, visual and tactile sensory aids. Features such as noise-buffering headphones, weighted mats, padded floors and floor chairs help attendees regulate their sensory experiences.

By offering these resources, the Quiet Zone empowers participants to regain balance and return to the event feeling refreshed and ready to engage.
