- Infant-toddler growth and development assessments
- · Case management, education and referrals
- · Individualized family service plan
- · No financial cost to family; no income eligibility





Children's Special Health Care Services

Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS) • 248.858.0056

Assists families with children and young adults through age 26 with qualifying severe, chronic health issues or disability, and adults with certain diagnoses.

- · Payment assistance for medical care, equipment, and medication
- · Connections to community resources
- · Families of all incomes eligible to apply

- · Referrals to community services












Nurturing Parenting Program (NPP) • 800.848.5533

Water Programs

Ensuring the safety of water resources and areas where people drink and interact with water to prevent disease and protect public health.

- · Monitor and sample groundwater in contamination areas
- · Issue private, public (Type II and III), and geothermal well permits
- · Inspect well installations and conduct water sampling
- Complete sanitary surveys of non-community public water supplies
- Test drinking water, public swimming pools, and public beach water
- Review private water sample test results and provide consultation
- · Inspect public swimming pools and spas



Shelter and Prevention Programs

Regulates and inspects areas where people live and work to reduce exposure to pests, chemicals and disease.

- Provide testing options, information, and consultation for mercury, and radon concerns in residential housing
- · Provide pest control information and consultation
- Inspect licensed day care centers, adult foster homes, group homes, and public campgrounds
- Perform plan reviews for daycare and childcare facilities
- Inspect and issue licenses for Body Art establishments
- · Train and issue permits to Body Art Practitioners

Land Programs

Ensure proper treatment of on-site sewage and protect waste from being directed inappropriately to our water resources to prevent illness.

- Evaluate soil and issue permits for on-site sewage disposal systems
- Review commercial and residential on-site sewage disposal system installation proposals
- Evaluate proposed land developments utilizing on-site sewage disposal and/or water wells
- Inspect and monitor licensed septage hauler vehicles and receiving facilities





















Food Safety Program

Works to prevent fraud, contamination, and illness by regulating and licensing food service establishments.

- · License and inspect restaurants, festival food booths, and food trucks
- · Conduct plan reviews for food service establishments
- · Investigate foodborne illness outbreaks and complaints
- · Food safety education for food service managers, staff, and others

Special Programs

- · Trapping, screening, and reporting on mosquitoes and ticks
- Assessing sources of potential lead exposure in children with elevated blood lead levels
- Investigating potential environmental exposures to Legionella
- Education on harmful algal blooms, vapor intrusion and PFAS
- Verifying compliance with medical waste producers


