## **Second Chair Program**

The IDSO supports the use of second chairs in complicated cases. Additionally, serving as a second chair can help attorneys improve their skills and gain the experience needed to advance to a higher category.

## Attorneys seeking a second chair . . .

- Should complete the IDSO's application for approval of a second chair.
- Should email their completed application for approval of a second chair to the IDSO Chief Attorney.

If a first chair attorney does not have a specific attorney in mind to second chair, they can contact the IDSO Principal Attorney for Compliance with Standard 6 and 7 for a list of attorneys interested in second chairing.

## Attorneys wanting to second chair . . .

- Should find an attorney who is willing to allow a second chair on their case.
- Should complete the IDSO's request for second chair assignment and email it to the IDSO Chief Attorney.

If an attorney needs help finding a case to second chair, they should contact the IDSO Principal Attorney for Compliance with Standard 6 and 7 for assistance.

## Other things to know

- 1. The IDSO has absolute discretion when deciding whether to allow a second chair.
- 2. The IDSO will pay second chairs at the applicable rate in its MIDC compliance plan, but under no circumstances will this rate exceed the rate for habitual 4<sup>th</sup> offenses.
- 3. The IDSO will only approve second chairs who are on the Oakland Felony/Misdemeanor Appointment List.

- 4. The IDSO can only pay second chairs to work on appointed criminal cases.
- 5. Absent extraordinary circumstances, the IDSO will only allow one second chair per case/defendant.
- 6. There is not a limit on the number of cases that an attorney can second chair, but requests from attorneys without prior second chair experience will be given priority.
- 7. Second chairs must comply with their obligations under the Rules of Michigan Professional Conduct and should be familiar with the IDSO's core competencies and performance guidelines.
