

### Overview

- 2022 funds are approximately \$250,000
  - Much higher in 2022 than it will be in subsequent years because of 2021 funds
- Projects should:
  - demonstrate best practices
  - treat high priority species
  - increase community awareness
  - and/or improve habitat
- Funds are not meant to be inclusive of all invasive species related projects, communities should strive to allocate dedicated funding to invasive species management and habitat improvement





### Overview Cont.

- Any municipality or CISMA member can apply
  - Can be completed on private or public lands but *applicant* must manage the project with CISMA
    - E.g. CISMA will not coordinate directly with homeowners associations. They can apply via their local CVT though.
  - Projects can involve the same kind of project in multiple locations
    - E.g. Knotweed treatments across a community submitted as one project.
- Funds are not distributed directly to communities. *Projects* are funded and OC CISMA/OCPR will utilize county contracts/processes to execute work.
- OC CISMA can utilize a portion of funds for OC CISMA strategic goals
  - E.g. Phragmites/knotweed roadside treatments

### Schedule

- Google Form sent to CISMA Members/posted online Mid-July and mid-November (annually)
- Projects submittal deadline Mid-September and mid-January (annually)
- Project selection announced Mid-November and mid-March
- Projects must be completed within approved fiscal year (October 1-September 31).
  - Projects/funds do not roll over!



## What projects are eligible?

Each applicant can request up to 2 projects per category per year (6 total)

#### Prevention

- Boot brush stations
- Detection or monitoring of new/priority species
- Purchase of outreach materials (AIS signage, etc.)
- Ordinance review/implementation

#### Treatment

• Treatment of priority species

#### Restoration

- Prescribed burning
- Winter mowing
- Native landscape conversion
- Native seeding
- Native tree planting
- Planning or design of project



### How projects will be selected

- 1. Municipalities/CISMA members will submit complete project requests (https://forms.gle/t3RKNNob1EbVnSMH6)
  - a. Provide as much information as possible!
- 2. OC CISMA/OCPR staff will initially subdivide projects to be completed by:
  - a. Staff (CISMA crew) OR
  - b. Contractors
- 3. Contractual projects will be quoted with OCPR existing blanket contracts
- 4. OC CISMA Treatment Subcommittee will evaluate all projects using the prioritization criteria and a Prioritized Project List will be created for all projects
- 5. The Prioritized Project List will be sent back to OCPR for review and approval by the OCPR Commission



## What gets funded?

- Projects will be approved/selected in the order they appear on the Prioritized Project List, up to the funding total
  - OCPR may right-size projects and maximize equity
    - Example: Unlikely to fund 2 huge projects vs. a smaller number of projects
    - If initially "selected" projects cannot be completed the next project(s) on the list will be funded.
- Initially approved/selected projects may not be completed due to factors outside of anyone's control (weather, contractor scheduling, etc.)
  - Those projects will be prioritized at the top of the following years list (no need to re-apply)
  - All other projects will need to re-apply



## Scoring: All projects

- Factors that will improve scores:
  - New projects
  - · Previous successful collaboration with CISMA
  - CISMA members in good standing
  - Reasonable
    - Timeline (within fiscal year, reasonable for style of project)
    - Scope
    - Budget
  - Maintenance and/or monitoring plans
  - Project oversight is reasonable for OCPR/OC CISMA staff

# Scoring: Project Specific

#### **Treatment projects**

- Address high priority species
- Improve high quality/rare natural community, or significant vector to a high quality and/or rare natural community; or provides significant habitat for rare or unique wildlife or wildlife migration.

### **Restoration and Prevention projects**

- Project will result in improvements to a high quality and/or rare natural area/community or is highly visible to the public
- Project will provide ecological benefits to surrounding natural or human communities

## Applicant Responsibilities

- Reply in a timely manner to messages from OCPR/OC CISMA staff.
- Communicate and obtain necessary permissions from the property owner(s) and/or neighbor(s)
- Attend project walk throughs
- Complete project maintenance such as sign installation and maintenance, watering of seeds/trees/native plants and other maintenance (i.e. follow-up treatments).
  - Specific guidance about required maintenance for each project type will be provided.
- Promote the project funding source through installation of small signage provided by OCPR at the project location and promote the projects through newsletters, social media or other relevant communication channels.



## OCPR/OC CISMA Responsibilities

- Retain contractor(s) and provide all project related oversight in the areas of:
  - Bidding and payment
  - Permitting
  - Scheduling
- Follow best management practices
- Communicate schedule requests to applicants in a timely matter for approval and discussion



### Project Examples

- A local city has garden beds in front of City Hall they would like to convert to a pollinator garden
  - Measure the area, seek internal approvals, apply for restoration funding
- 3 homeowners associations have complained about phragmites in their neighborhoods
  - Collect permissions from all affected landowners and apply for treatment funding
- A community trail would like to install boot brush stations at all their primary entrance points with signage
  - Ensure all landowners have provided permission and apply for prevention funding
